## Hello to All,

It was a case of "We Should Have Been There"...this past Thursday, August 1<sup>st</sup>. A *juvenile BALD EAGLE* made a visit to Wooded Island and Bobolink Meadow. Its' presence was observed by both Paul Clyne and Randy Shonkwiler. The Big Fella perched on the snag south of the Japanese Garden, just a short distance from the Koi Pond. Have to wonder what caught its eye to have it make a stop. Paul added a "picture perfect moment" encounter. A bold *Ruby-throated Hummingbird* had the audacity to buzz the eagle. Daring and courage can come in small packages. The eagle flew over Bobolink Meadow and eventfully found Jackson Park wanting to meet its desires. Off it went.

The Green Heron nest is empty. A report from a regular Wooded Island visitor is that one of the youngsters did not survive. Those bigger herons pose a threat to nestlings...just speculation on the possible predators. No crime scene evidence that would uphold in court.

Turtles were seen sunny themselves on logs.

There is a Stop Light at 58<sup>th</sup> Street. Make a turn at the Stop Light towards the Museum. Turn Left (south) at the intersection of Science Drive and Columbia Drive. Go through the parking lot to the west end near Darrow Bridge.
