Huge Wings Over Chicago and in Skies Around the World — CRANES

Dr. Archibald has been fascinated by cranes since meeting them in northern Canada in 1966. In 1973, he co-founded the ICF in Baraboo, Wisconsin. Today ICF is recognized worldwide for its productive efforts to help eleven species of threatened cranes. Dr. Archibald will not only explain why there are increasing numbers of Sandhill Cranes migrating over Chicago, but he will share an update on cranes worldwide and a personal anecdote about why he danced with a Whooping Crane.



Map and directions for BIRDING AMERICA XII



Driving directions to North Park University, 3225 West Foster Avenue, Chicago:

From the north: Take I-94 eastbound (Edens Expressway) to the Cicero exit (to Foster). Take Cicero south to Foster Avenue, turn east (left) on Foster and continue to Kedzie, about two miles.

From the south: Take I-94 westbound (Dan Ryan Expressway) and proceed northwest on I-90/94 (Kennedy Expressway). Exit at Kimball Avenue. Travel north (right) on Kimball about two miles to Foster Avenue and turn east (right) on Foster. Proceed two blocks, to Kedzie.

From the west: (Or from O'Hare Airport) take I-90/94 eastbound (Kennedy) to the Austin exit (to Foster). At the end of the exit ramp, turn east (left) and follow the curve to reach Foster. Turn east (left) on Foster and continue to Kedzie, about three miles.

From the east: Take Lake Shore Drive (from either direction) to the Foster Avenue exit. Travel west on Foster and continue to Kedzie, about three miles.

- Parking is free in the University lot on the southeast corner of Foster and Kedzie.
- Additional parking available in lot at Kedzie and Carmen (just south of river). Turn left at Carmen for entrance.
- Also, additional parking is available on Kimball, just south of Foster, behind Shell Station on SE corner of Kimball and Foster; enter from alleyway even though sign says Parking for Faculty and Staff only.
- On-street parking is available in the immediate vicinity of the Campus.
